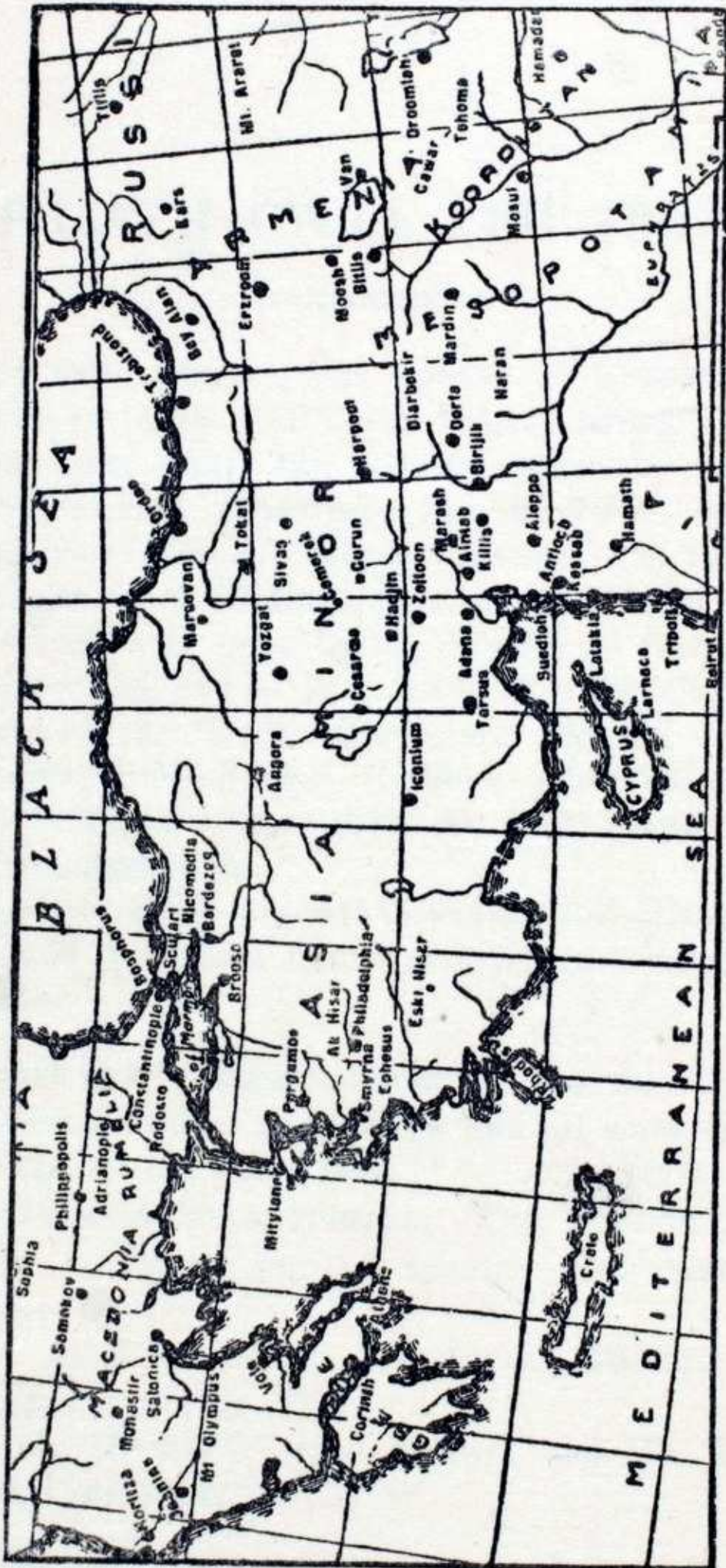

Women and girls' industries (handkerchief embroidery chiefly), employing 1,450 in Oorfa, and 400 in four towns outside.

Special thanks for the coming of our engineer, Mr. Clendinning; for restoration to health of a faithful helper; for new lot purchased, and Government permission to build, in ways greatly favouring the extension of boys' industries; for sympathy and help from our Mission helpers in time of need, and cheer from visitors, foreign and native, during the year.

Prayer for a young man to be soon appointed as colleague in the work; that the increased activities of our growing Institutions may be truly energized by the Holy Spirit.

For a spirit of self-sacrifice, that all needs may be met, and that more interest may be felt in these lands.

For a blessing on this Prayer Cycle, and for the Secretaries, Mrs. Constantine and Miss Van Sommer. Pray for a spiritual latter rain, and that workers and converts alike may have an intense glowing love to the Lord, and a passion for souls.

For ability to speak the Turkish, Armenian, and Greek languages; for a gift of the Holy Ghost to win souls for the Lord, and that His own prayer may be answered in intense reality, that all may be one, that the world may know that He has sent us. Lord, teach us to pray!
