HISTORICAL SKETCH.

The history of the Institute dates back to 1891. Its founder, the late Rev. H. S. Jenanyan, D.D., who was the founder of St. Paul's Institute, Tarsus, and at that time head of the work there during one of his missionary tours in the Apostolic regions in the summer of 1891 visited Konia and realizing the great need for a good Christian School in that region promised to send a teacher there

A small day-school started through a special gift of \$100 from a friend in New York, was the humble beginning from which the Apostolic Institute of Konia was destined to grow. This little school with 35 students was originally started in a rented building in 1892.

In 1894 the first building was purchased; then a boarding school, with 15 students from different towns, was added to the day-school. That same year also saw the opening of the first girls' school in Konia.

The work prospered year after year and its growth required the services of abler workers in the fields until in 1901, Rev. A. H. Haigazian who had received his degree of Ph.D. from Yale University was sent there to take charge of the Institute, which position he has held most faithfully until the present date.

In 1901, Rev. M. Jenanyan and his wife, who had studied in this country were also added to the staff of workers of the Institute and in 1902 the first Evangelical Church in Konia was organized with 40 members.

In 1903, the second and larger building was purchased, the school was enlarged, new additions were made to the faculty and a new impetus was given to the work.

In 1907, the Founder and President was called to his heavenly home, but the Committee of Christian gentlemen who had so loyally encouraged and aided him in the work, decided to continue this mission. The Institute was incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, in 1908.

The recently established constitutional government in Turkey has indicated its appreciation of the services of the Apostolic Institute officially recognizing it as a college.

DEPARTMENTS.

The Apostolic Institute has four departments:

- 1. College department, five years' course.
- 2. Preparatory department, four years' course.
- 3. Primary department, three years' course.
- 4. Girls' department (Primary), four years' course.

PURPOSE OF THE INSTITUTE.

To give the young people of this land a high and Christian education and to prepare them for useful lives and responsible positions. Every effort is made to help and encourage the poor orphan and destitute.

LOCATION.

The City of Konia, built on a high plateau, 3200 feet above sea level, is the capital of the Province of the same name. It is famous for its numerous mosques of Seljuk style and by the ruins of the Palace of Seljuk Sultans. It is the headquarter of the Mevlavi Dervishes; the Türbeh contains the tomb of Hazret-i-Mevlana, founder of the order.

The city is connected with Constantinople and Smyrna by railroad and in the near future the same railroad will be extended as far as Bagdad. So that Konia is one of the most important centers of the famous Bagdad Railroad.

Konia has 60,000 inhabitants, of whom about 5,000 are Armenians, about 5,000 Greeks, the rest being Turks.

INSTITUTE'S FIELD OF USEFULNESS.

This is the only Christian College in this part of Asia Minor, in a district with an area of 80,000 square miles, and a population of 3,000,000.

The following table will show the distance of the leading American Colleges from Konia.

- 1. Robert College, Constantinople, 2 days' journey by rail.
- 2. International College, Smyrna, 3 days' journey by rail.
- 3. St. Paul's Institute, Tarsus, 5-6 days' by rail and carriage.
- 4. Central Turkey College, Aintab, 12 days' journey by rail and carriage.
- 5. Syrian Protestant College, Beyrout, 8 days' journey by rail, carriage and steamer.
 - 6. Anatolia College, Marsovan, 10 days' journey by carriage.
 - 7. Euphrates College, Harpoot, 12 days' journey by carriage.

The Institute has received students from many provinces of the Turkish Empire, even from Bulgaria and Greece.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

- Applicants for admission to the college must be over fifteen, and for the preparatory department over twelve. No boy under 8 years is admitted to the primary department.
- 2. Each candidate must bring a certificate as to moral character and financial condition from his pastor.
- 3. Candidates for college course must pass examinations in the lessons of the Fourth Form of the preparatory department, and those for the preparatory department must pass examinations in the studies of the Fourth year of the primary department.
- 4. Each candidate's health will be examined by the school physician at the beginning of the school term.
- 5. Boarding students pay 12 Turkish pounds for board and tuition, (seven pounds to be paid at the beginning of the year, and the balance at Christmas), and day pupils, 2 Turkish pounds for tuition.

BUILDINGS.

The Institute has two buildings. One is used for boarders: has large and airy rooms, but can accommodate only 50 boys comfortably, (though we put there sometimes 70). In front of this building is a beautiful garden of one acre, water for which is pumped from an adjoining well by an American windmill.

The other building is used for study, recitations and chapel exercises. This building was repaired and enlarged by a generous

donation of \$1,000 from Mrs. Crozer as a memorial gift and is called "Crozer Hall."

RELIGIOUS EXERCISES.

Each day's work is begun by devotional exercises lasting a quarter of an hour led by the teachers.

On Sunday the students attend their respective churches. At 11 A. M. all students assemble in the study hall where a sermon is preached by the pastor or one of the faculty. At 4 P. M. there is Sunday School at which all are required to be present.

In the evening there is a song service for half-an-hour, and a short sermon by one of the faculty.

All services, study hours and meals are begun and ended by a prayer or a hymn.

Y. M. C. A.

About 40 young men of different nationalities and creeds come together every Sunday at 2 P. M. for prayer meeting and other religious exercises. It is a great blessing to the entire student body.

NON-SECTARIAN BUT CHRISTIAN.


Protestants, Gregorians, Roman Catholics and Orthodox Greek all join in brotherly love to worship God and their Saviour Jesus Christ.


THE LIBRARY.

This contains more than 2000 choice books, almost entirely in English. It includes valuable sets of the International Cyclopedia, Cyclopedia Britannica, World's Best Literature, World's Best Oratory, World's Best Music, World's Great Masterpieces, Modern Eloquence, World's Great Travellers, etc., etc.

THE READING ROOM.

The library is used as a reading room, (a separate room is absolutely necessary). It is supplied with various newspapers and magazines. Among them we may mention 3 Armenian dailies, The Avedaper, Turkish and Armenian (American Board Publication), Gotchnag (Armenian weekly published in New York),

Asbarez (Arm. monthly published in Fresno, Cal.), Hantees Amsorya (Arm. monthly published in Vienna, Austria), The World's Work, McClure's Magazine, Success, Review of Reviews, Missionary Review, Congregationalist, etc., etc.

THE LITERARY CLUB.

Students from the college department have frequent meetings for literary discussions. They edit two college monthlies, one The Twentieth Century and the other a humorous paper Speechatert. Dr. Merdinyan of the class of 1896, now resident of Central Falls, R. I. offers every year a prize of five dollars for the best composition by the members of the club. The Literary Club presents a drama once a month.

LANGUAGES.

The languages taught are English, Armenian, Greek, Turkish and French. Scientific instruction in the college department entirely and in the preparatory department partly is in English.

The official language of the college is English and students are required to use only English in conversation with each other.

ATHLETICS.

The Institute encourages the students in healthy exercises taking them often to the fields for open air games. The need of a gymnasium is greatly felt.

THE CHOIR

The choir is composed of 25 students. Four times a week they have rehearsals preparing hymns, anthems, etc., for Sunday evening song service, occasional meetings, commencement exercises, etc. Occasionally part of the orchestra joins them, giving the religious meetings and other exercises a delightful attractiveness.

THE YESSAYIAN ORCHESTRA.

Mr. Stepan Yessayian, of the class of 1904, now resident of New York, recently gave \$90 towards the establishment of an orchestra for the college. Besides the violins, which belong to the students themselves, the orchestra has clarionets, contre-bass, violoncello, piston, flute, etc. In the future we hope to increase the number of instruments by giving concerts. For a leader, we have engaged an Italian gentleman who is very competent in this line. We regard the orchestra as one of the most useful and attractive additions of the year.

THE MONTHLY SOCIAL EVENING.

Once a month the members of the faculty, their wives and children, all the instructors and students come together to spend a pleasant evening; games are played, humorous speeches are made, short funny stories told, a short drama presented by students, and light refreshments served. The purpose is to make the boarders feel more at home, to make them acquainted with teachers' families, and help prepare them for another month's hard study.

THE PUMP ENGINE FUND.

In order to save the trees of the garden and to have lawns around the buildings which will make the campus more attractive we need a continuous supply of water which can only be secured by a pumping engine.

PRINTING PRESS FUND.

We need a printing press. The publication of books, pamphlets and a monthly paper will extend the usefulness of the Institute to the remote corners of the land. The value of good literature cannot be overestimated.

HELP TO POOR BOYS.

On account of the extreme poverty prevailing in the country many of the students are unable to pay full board and tuition. The purposes of the Institute is to help such students and during the past year it assisted more than 150. However, to cultivate in them the spirit of self-help, the Institute requires all students receiving such aid to assist in the manual work of the school.




